BACKGROUND	This report is to provide The Town Council with an update on the recreation facilities including recreation grounds, other open spaces, cemeteries, plant & equipment, and allotments.
INFORMATION	
TOWN MEAD	Grass cutting is coming to an end. The site is kept to a good standard and is litter picked and inspected daily. Grass pitches marked out weekly. The artificial grass carpet on the 3G pitch is swept twice a week. The play area is checked and litter picked daily.
LARSENS	The park is mowed and kept to a good standard. Two grass pitches have been installed and games are being booked. The pitches are marked out weekly. The play area is inspected and litter picked daily.
NINEFIELDS	The site is kept mowed and maintained and three pitches are marked out weekly and are being booked. The play area is inspected and litter picked daily.
CEMETERY AND GARDEN OF REST	Grass cutting and work on hedges and trees being cut back is ongoing. Some uneven block work where needed is being re-laid and brindle blocks replaced to make the paths safer to walk on. The site is litter picked and bins emptied daily.
CHURCHYARD AND GARDEN OF REST	The site has been kept cut and well maintained through the summer. The church yard is litter picked and bins are emptied daily.
OPEN SPACES	A tree survey has been put in place which helps identify any trees that need attention. The records show which trees need to be prioritised and which ones need working on at later dates.  The war memorial was planted and maintained for this years Remembrance Day Service.  The steel columns for the Christmas lights have been put in around the town and the two large Christmas trees erected next to the churches. The team are installing lights and trees around the town for the Cavalcade of Lights switch on.

# RE: STRUCTURAL APPRAISAL OF CHAPEL BUILDING, WALTHAM ABBEY CEMETERY EN9 1NX FOR WALTHAM ABBEY TOWN COUNCIL

#### 1.0 PREAMBLE

Thank you for your instruction to undertake a preliminary structural assessment of the building and recommend solutions for repair of the defects.

The survey was undertaken on the morning of 21st October 2024 as a visual inspection of defective areas, without any intrusive exploratory works or removal of fixtures and fittings.

The weather was dry during the inspection. All references in this report to left hand side, right hand side, front and rear assume a position standing facing the building from the circular access road.

#### 2.0 GENERAL

The building is a Victorian chapel building located within the main grounds of Waltham Abbey cemetery.

The building has a tarmac access road area to the front and grass areas to the other three sides, with nearby burial graves at various locations.

The interior comprises a single full height space currently used for material and tool storage purposes.

British Geological Survey maps show the general geology to be London Clay formation.

The property is located within the region of Epping Forest District Council.

#### 3.0 CLARIFICATIONS

We have not inspected woodwork or other parts of the structure which are obstructed, covered, unexposed or inaccessible, and we are therefore unable to report that any such part of the property is free from defect.

We have not tested for damp and not carried out detailed examinations or testing of ventilation to roof spaces or sub-floor voids.

The upper parts of the interior roof were beyond the reach of a telescopic ladder. It was therefore only partially visible from the head of the interior walls only.

This report is confidential and has been prepared solely for the client named herein following an initial non-intrusive inspection, and is therefore based on limited information. #### 4.0 DESCRIPTION OF STRUCTURE

The construction of the main building generally consists of a double pitched tied and vaulted roof with replacement concrete interlocking tiles, solid masonry exterior walls, and a concrete ground floor.

The two main roof pitches are formed with cut timber rafter frames. Each rafter is propped by a horizontal timber strut with diagonal bracing at mid-height. The rafter frames are tied at low level by three steel rods fixed to two timber wall plates at eaves height.

The four main corners of the building are strengthened by 450mm thick masonry buttresses. There is further stepped buttressing to the main front elevation, which provides strengthening to the bell tower above.

Window and door arches are formed in stonework with exposed brick soldier arching immediately above.

#### 5.0 OBSERVATIONS

#### General

The building appears to be well constructed overall, but there are signs of movement to the rear gable and front bell tower, together with deteriorating building fabric.

The site is approximately level, with no topographical features observed that might lead to foundation movement.

The following nearby trees were recorded at approximate locations as follows:

- 1 no. Japanese Yew at 3m distance from the middle of the main right hand elevation.
- 1 no. Japanese Yew at 5.5m distance from the rear of the main right hand elevation.

Other coniferous trees were also observed at greater distances from the rear and left hand side.

There is a rainwater downpipe located to the front left and right hand corners of the building. A nearby gulley was observed to the front right hand area within the adjacent access roadway.

There is a timber boarding layer beneath the roof tiles within the main roof space. No evidence of water penetration was observed to those pitched roof areas that were visible.





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### 6.0 DISCUSSION & CONCLUSIONS

#### Main roof

Based on a preliminary inspection of those parts that were visible, the main pitched roof structure appears to be in good condition for its age, with no signs of movement recorded.

Main pitched roof robust, with no signs of movement or timber decay observed.

#### Rear gable

There is evidence of a movement to the main rear gable at higher level. This is visible along the line of the pitched parapets, which appear to lean towards the front (09B, 10). No bowing at lower level were observed, and the adjacent pitched roof construction provides a natural buttressing effect. At the present time the rear gable does not appear to be a safety risk, and the movement may be historic.

#### Front bell tower

There is evidence of twisting to the front bell tower at high level. This is visible when viewed from the front left and right sides of the tower (21, 25). The parapet below the bell tower appears to lean towards the rear (15).

Based on the likely proximity of below ground drains in the area of the main front elevation and bell tower, it would be sensible to inspect the condition of the below ground drains in that area, to ensure they are not contributing to movement of the front elevation. Damaged and leaking drains can sometimes cause loss of fines in subsoils, leading to foundation movement over time.

#### Stone cross at rear

There is a stone cross seated above the main rear gable which appears to be displaced (11). The cross has an observable lean towards the front right hand direction. The stone and mortar bedding immediately below the base of the cross appears to be deteriorated (09A).

#### Cracking and general condition

Local cracks were recorded at the heads of some stone window arches internally (16-20), as well as at the head of the main entrance arch (22), and possible movement to the brick soldier arch over the middle left hand arch window (13). All these cracks are considered minor and should not be cause for concern at the present time.

The exterior stonework and brickwork is badly deteriorated in various locations (01-08, 09C, 14, 23, 24A-C), and the building has clearly suffered from a general lack of maintenance. Defective and poorly maintained brickwork pointing was observed throughout the main elevations, and whilst the interior plastering appears to have undergone some relatively recent repairs, it remains in poor condition.

It should be highlighted that trees in close proximity to a building can cause movement cracking, and number of conifer trees are present at various distances from all elevations. In cases where the

underlying geology is a shrinkable London clay, tree roots can cause a change in moisture content

#### 7.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended that a high level roof inspection of the stone cross at the rear is carried out by a stone conservation specialist.

and soil volume over time, leading to movement of shallow Victorian foundations.

The advice of an arborist should be obtained to assess the most appropriate method for mitigating any future damage to the building from the nearby trees, and to confirm tree species. It should be noted that it is possible some of these trees may be covered by Tree Preservation Orders within the Town and Country Planning Acts.

A cctv survey mapping of any drain runs beneath and adjacent to the front of the building should be carried out to identify any damaged pipes or joints for repair. Access for cctv via a drain cover or gulley should be confirmed prior to survey.

To ensure the future longevity of the building, an allowance should be made for repairs to stonework, brickwork and pointing. It is recommended that any such work is carried out by an appropriately skilled contractor who is familiar with the correct use of lime mortar pointing and other restoration techniques. We would be happy to pass on the contact details of a local stone conservation specialist with whom we have worked successfully in the past.

It is recommended that the advice of a timber and damp proof specialist is obtained for a general assessment of any timber defects and damp throughout the roof structure.

Given the age of the building it is possible there may be asbestos contained within certain building components. Any work to such material, for example drilling, sawing or removal, can pose a hazard to health, and if removed it should be disposed of in accordance with current Regulations.

## 4 Church Update (RW)

### **5 Sub Committee Reports**

#### Tourism (TG)

Like the Partnership, the Tourism Sub Committee does not meet in August so this report is of our July meeting. There was a good attendance and members heard that the TIC was doing quite well and was still open seven days a week. There were several items of new stock now on sale:- painted stones with pictures of Henry VIII and King Harold and an accompanying leaflet explaining the history; pilgrim shells which again had an accompanying leaflet; and local raw honey. We were pleased to learn about the battleaxe blade, probably 11<sup>th</sup> century, which had come to light during the recent review of the Museum's collections. It was discovered during the 1860 work on the Abbey Church, and at one time had been on display in the church. It would in future be on permanent display in the Museum's Treasure Gallery, with a specially made replica alongside it which would allow visitors to handle a battleaxe. The display would be launched in October as part of an Anglo-Saxon exhibition. Both the King Harold Day Society and Waltham Abbey Historical Society had contributed to the cost of the replica. The monthly guided tours are continuing on the third Saturday of each month until October. The next one would be on Saturday 21st September, 11am from the TIC, when the guide would be

Jonathan Hyde. The Art Trail prizegiving took place on 24th July when we welcomed the Deputy Mayor, a representative of our sponsors, Pixel Business Centres, and of course Paul representing WATP who very kindly sponsored one of the prizes. We are already working on ideas for 2025 and a new member has joined the committee. Good and full reports were received from partners, with much happening in the town.

## 6. Associated and other local groups reports

#### Royal Gunpowder Mills:

A Firework display is being planned for Saturday November 2<sup>nd</sup>. Early Bird tickets will be £7.50 adult, £5.00 child. This is a 50% reduction on the price if purchased on the day. There will be a Family Fun day from 3.30pm. Visitors are advised to use public transport or walk. On September 27<sup>th</sup>, the High Sherrif of Essex will be visiting the site. Conservation work on the only Grade 1 listed building has been completed and should re-open in October.

LVRP: Expensive repairs have been carried out on the brickwork with more to follow. The annual mowing of the Moat is currently being undertaken. The Bank holiday Music Festival took place with only minor complaints so it will be happening again next year.

Historical Society (TG): The first meeting of the new season will be on Friday 20th September, 7.30pm at the Baptist Church, Paradise Road, when the speaker will be Gary Lewis on Hitchcock's Leytonstone. As always visitors are welcome to attend in return for a £2 donation to the Society's funds. During the summer we have carried out a survey of members to find their views on whether we should re-start having refreshments at meetings to give a more social atmosphere. This had stopped following covid. We also asked members whether they would like to have a Saturday afternoon meeting in January (instead of an evening) when the weather is often bad. The results showed support for the refreshments, so we shall start at the September meeting. There were mixed views on the Saturday meeting so that will not occur at present.
